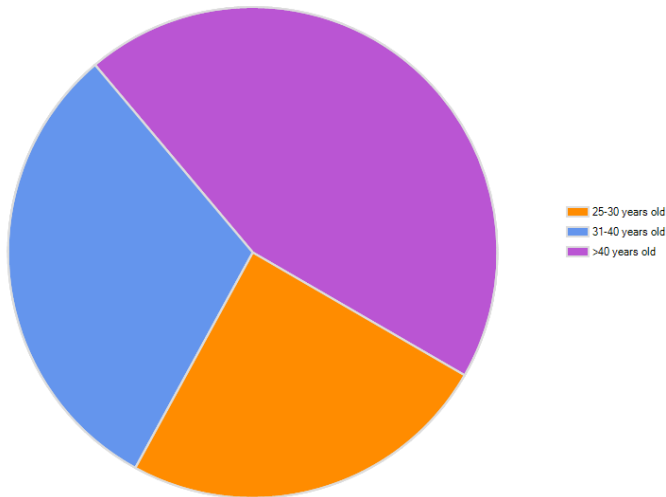


Results of the ESB survey 2010

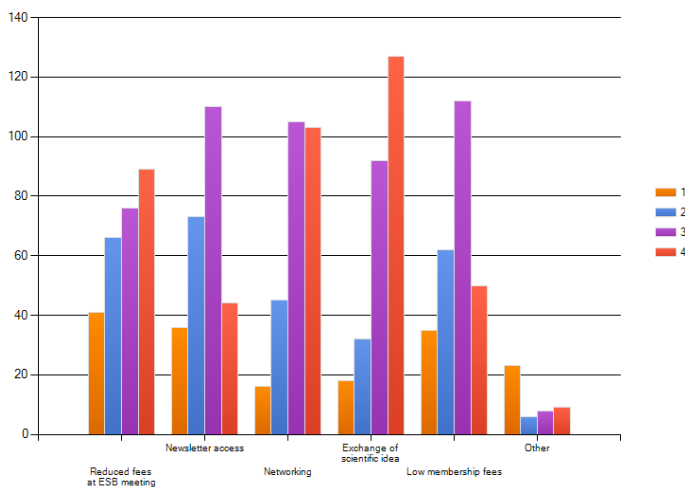

Could you indicate to which age range you belong to?



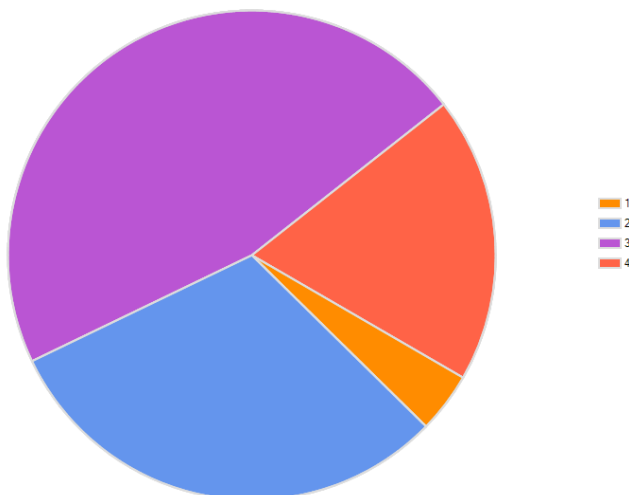
280 (out of 500) members took sometime to answer the ESB survey 2010. The results obtained could then be considered as fairly representative of the opinions share by our members.

Evaluate the importance of the following items in influencing your decision to be an ESB member (1: not important; 4: very important):



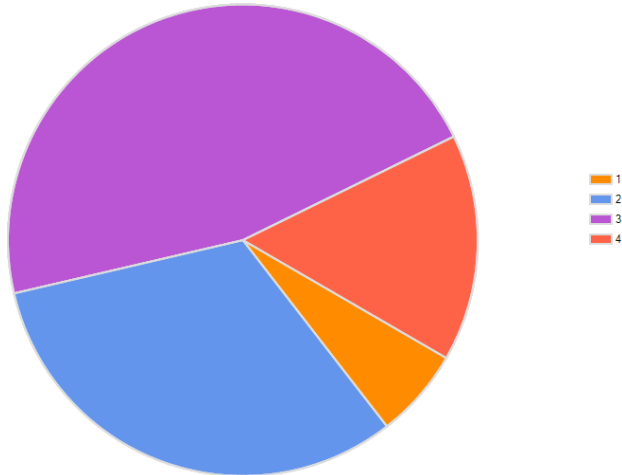

Is the ESB website a useful resource? (1: not useful; 4: very useful)



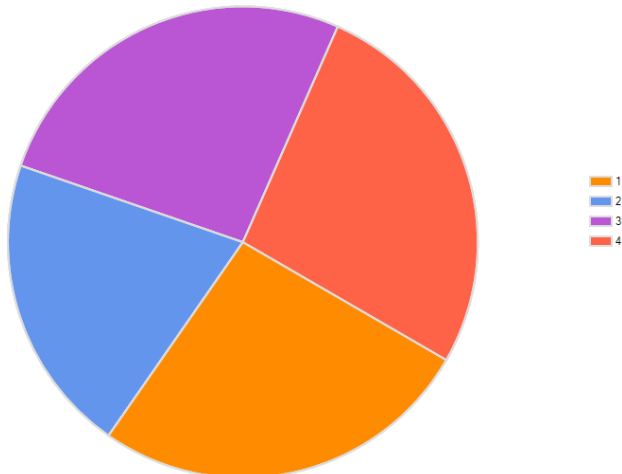
We are glad to see that the effort put by the ESB board to have an attractive ESB web site is acknowledged by our members.

Is the ESB Newsletter an important source of information? (1: not important; 4: very important)



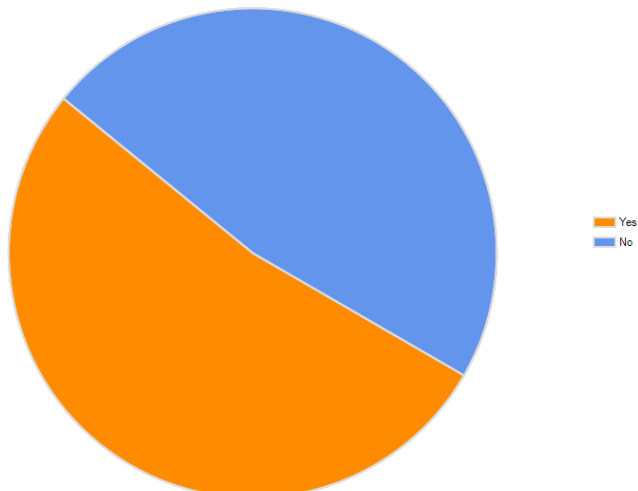
As for the web, the edition of a Newsletter demands a considerable amount of work, which seems to be useful for the majority of our members.

Is the possibility to have journal suscriptions through the ESB important? (1: not important; 4: very important)



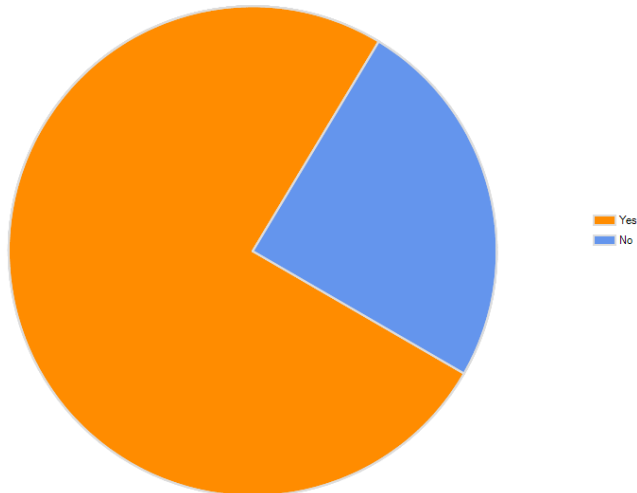
It is always debated if the access to journals is useful to our members as an access through their own university is usually possible. The answer to this question is yes for 50% of our members.

Are you attending ESB meetings regularly?



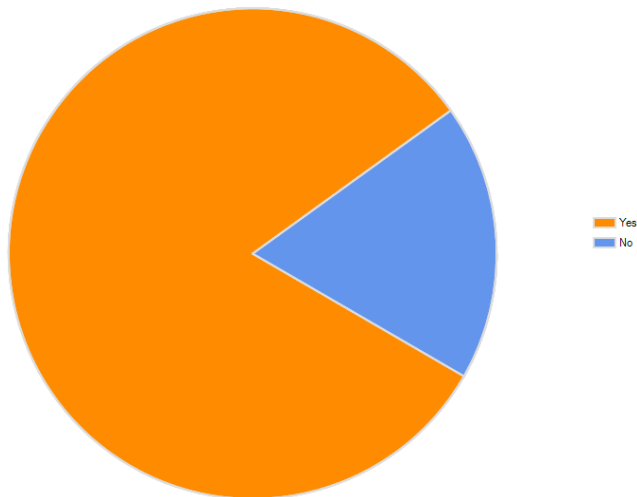

If you are a student member, is the student corner useful?



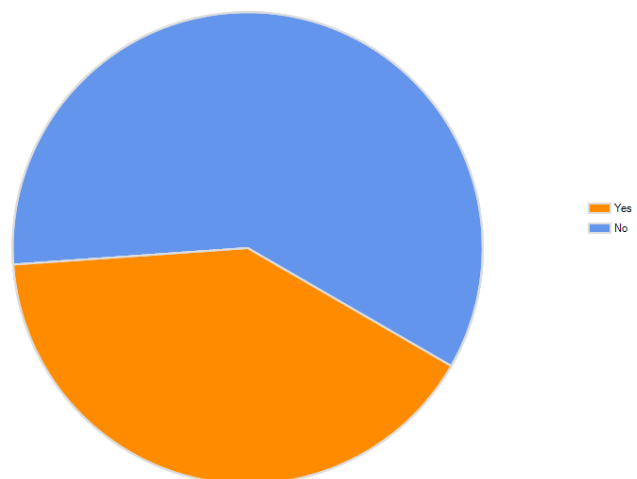
This is the very good news of this survey. Our young members appreciate the effort the ESB is putting in trying to incorporate them more in the life of our society.
